This year (1 July 2024 – 30 June 2025) marked a period of significant, measured progress for the Thriving Queensland Kids Partnership (TQKP). The work to date across our focus initiatives has laid foundations upon which we successfully delivered every activity critical to activate the partnership, leading to early but strong signals of system change. Building on these strong foundations we can begin to leverage change across the whole system. Together with our partners, we are reshaping how Queensland's systems understand and respond to the needs of children, young people, and families.

Across the state, TQKP is emerging as a catalyst for change, engaging with people and organisations across health, early learning, education, family support, mental health, disability, child protection, youth services, housing, justice and more.

Our collective efforts are driving new ways of working that prioritise prevention, elevate First Nations voices, and translate the science of child development into everyday practice.

At the heart of this work is community. By strengthening the foundations of community-led change, TQKP is supporting local leaders, caregivers, and cultural knowledge holders to build capability, confidence, and collective ownership in child and young person development. Through strategic support and co-designed approaches, communities are embedding wellbeing into daily life, and it's happening everywhere, from playgroups, to schools, to local councils.

From concept to practice

In the past 12 months, TQKP has supported leaders to connect, collaborate, and "play and learn" together. These cross-sector connections are laying the groundwork for more coordinated responses to children's developmental needs.

These relationships are accelerating progress. What may once have taken years we are now being told is advancing in months, thanks to trust, shared language, and a unified commitment to children's wellbeing.

Backing communities

The past 12 months also featured a strong collaboration of people and place. Co-designed with place-based collaborators, the Queensland Place-based Rivermap identified strategic opportunities to strengthen place-based work and led to the development of the Queensland Place-based Network Model which has, so far, secured \$1.5 million in funding.

Place-based partnerships are crucial for advancing equity, as they are uniquely aware of, and positioned to respond to local context, strengths and history. The network brings together over 50 communities to build the social infrastructure to collectively steward the system and increase efficiencies, drive innovation, and future-proof our Queensland place-based ecosystem.

Embedding neuroscience into practice


A cornerstone of our work has been embedding neuroscience into professional learning, tertiary education, and organisational policy and practice. Brain science provides a common language that helps professionals across diverse sectors communicate, collaborate, and respond more effectively. This year, we:

- integrated neuroscience into curricula at the University of the Sunshine Coast and TAFE Queensland
- saw the Enabling Workforces and Organisations Toolkit inform curricular reviews and extend its influence into workplaces and communities well beyond the project's initial scope, including youth justice early action groups in Townsville and Mt Isa

 worked with partners such as Early Childhood Australia, Montessori, and the State Library of Queensland to embed neuro-informed approaches into professional platforms.

These efforts mean that a growing number of Queensland professionals, including teachers, health workers, and social workers, now have practical, accessible resources to translate knowledge into practice.

By embedding neuroscience sustainably into existing standards and training systems, we are strengthening Queensland's workforce to better support children, young people, and families to thrive.

Building leadership and shared language

Alongside embedding knowledge, we invested in leadership and communication. Through the Framing Champions Leadership Group, we brought together 21 CEOs and executive leaders from 12 organisations, including peak bodies, government, service providers, academia, and advocacy groups.

The impact of this work is evident.

An independent evaluation of the Framing Initiative found that:

- participants are using framing strategies across all communication types, suggesting these approaches are becoming embedded in their practice
- almost all participants have changed their communication practice since first engaging with TQKP
- most participants agree that they feel confident in explaining the concept of framing and using frames in the workplace.

Additionally, a speaker's brief to support effective framing of messages was prepared for the National Early Years Policy Summit and the Shaping Futures Symposium; and the Framing Champions, represented by 11 organisations, released a Call to Action for all Queenslanders to champion early years messaging that transforms mindsets.

In April 2025, we co-hosted the Framing for Change event with FrameWorks Institute and Minderoo Foundation, drawing 80 participants and demonstrating the growing confidence of leaders to invite peers into the movement.

The Framing for Change Learning Hub, launched in September 2024, has since been visited more than 1,100 times, spreading these tools and practices more widely.

Translating knowledge into action

Our Thriving Kids in Disasters (TKiD) initiative has also gained momentum. This year we:

- released the Phase 1 Report and shared findings with nearly 90 government, philanthropy, and community leaders
- delivered "Words into Practice" activities with more than 400 people, including more than 200 children, across Queensland communities impacted by disasters
- established the TKiD Leadership Alliance, bringing together around 40 representatives to co-design the Action and Investment Plan
- released both the Action and Investment Plan and the Community Engagement Report, formally commencing Phase 3 and securing momentum for the future.

This work ensures children and families remain central to disaster management, recovery, and resilience strategies.

Every milestone achieved this year reflects TQKP's ways of working: to connect, catalyse and learn. Our work is about more than organisational change; it is about giving every child in Queensland the chance to thrive.

As we move into our next phase, with generous investment from a growing group of philanthropic partners, we carry both responsibility and hope. We know that systems change is long-term and complex. It requires deep collaboration, trust, and a willingness to adapt.

Most importantly, it requires us to remain grounded in the voices and lived experiences of children, young people, families, communities and the dedicated professionals who support them.

We are proud of what we have collectively achieved in 2024-25 and even more excited about the opportunities ahead. Together, with our partners and Queensland communities, we will continue to drive meaningful, lasting impact for Queensland's children and young people in 2025 and beyond.

In June 2025, we launched our new, bold five-year Impact Strategy setting the agenda for our next chapter.

We have an ambitious vision to transform outcomes for all children and young people in Queensland within one generation.

Since 2020, over 1,000 people and organisations have partnered and collaborated with TQKP, and many more have engaged in the growing TQKP community.

We are grateful to all our partners, collaborators and networks who have engaged in the TQKP journey so far, including our investing philanthropic partners, agencies providing grants, other donors and our host, ARACY, who are making our collective work possible.
